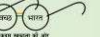



IT Industry: Hope, Expectations and Challenges

IT industry in India is contributing significantly in country's economy. The Information Technology and related various sub-sectors, In 2017, represented about 8% of the country's overall GDP. The reports shows that in financial year 2019, IT Industry in India created annual revenue close to US \$180 billion which itself is a significant increase from the generated revenue ten years ago. A substantial part of this revenue came through exports, while domestic revenue was less than US \$ 50 billion for the mentioned period. Also, the year 2018 witnessed a major spurt in startups in India. India has retained its position as the third-largest startup base in the world with over 4,750 technology startups, with about 1,500 startups in 2018 alone (NAASCOM, 2018). Startups are dynamic engines for employment generation and worldwide, startups create 60% of the new jobs. It is gratifying to see India embarking on this strategy and creating an enabling ecosystem for startups. In the context of India scaling up 30 positions in 2018 over its 2017 ranking of ease of doing business, it would be prudent to expect that the Indian startup ecosystem, especially the tech startups, would attract greater interest from investors across the world.

The pace, with which the disruption of technology has taken place, has now reached at its upsurge in the year 2018. Society, in general, and industry and government, in particular, are spiritedly embracing digital technologies. Technologies such as artificial intelligence (AI), Internet of things (IoT), augmented reality, virtual reality, machine learning (ML), big data analytics, robotic process automation, and 3D Printing are increasingly becoming mainstream, cutting across industries. For instance, Block Chain was originally thought to be an application in financial services and retail, which now found its way into agriculture, healthcare, governance, logistics, etc. These technologies are providing numerous new opportunities for large enterprises as much as they are aiding the start-ups in developing new products and service lines, improving efficiency, productivity, and competence levels, giving thrust to the economic growth of the country while simultaneously bringing about social equality.

While opening up an abundance of new opportunities, these technology disruptions are presenting a formidable challenge to the \$167 billion (2017-18 revenue) strong Indian information technology (IT) industry, which is employing about four million professionals. Some of the leading IT service providers in India including IBM and HP, as well as Indian-based companies, Wipro and Tata Consultancy Services (TCS), overall, in 2017, the industry provided direct employment to almost 4 million people and indirect employment to more than 10 million. Of these employees, over

420,000 worked for TCS and more than 228,000 worked at Infosys, is based in Bangalore. TCS revenue reached almost 1.5 trillion Indian rupees in 2019, making it the largest India-based IT services company that year. This ranks it as one of the world's largest IT services providers.

According to various Survey and Research Reports including NASSCOM (2018), World Economic Forum (2018) and Accenture (2018), the upskilling and reskilling of over 50% of the currently employed industry workforce has become an indispensable obligation for the IT-ITeS industry. The NASSCOM initiative "Future Skills" is one of its effect which is an AI-enabled learning platform to get India accelerated on the journey to building skills. The platform enables the discovery, continuous learning, and deep skilling in the emerging technologies with the ability to customize individual learning path for each professional based on their ambitions and their capabilities to learn.

As we step into the new year, the future continues to look bright for the Indian IT-ITeS industry. The industry is anticipated to grow around 10% for several more years. Apparently, the talent requirements for the new opportunities are different from that of the past. Indian IT companies have to adopt these new technologies in a big way by skilling their employees and by taking risks in building products around these technologies. It is believed that the year 2020 will be challenging, yet with an abundance of opportunities on the horizon, it could be quite a gratifying one as well.

Women in Media

The male concept of a woman who is young, fair, slim and beautiful is propagated through commercials. These idealized norms may make women with ordinary looks feel insecure and inferior. A market of these products is cultivated by encashing on the anxieties and insecurities of women.

But as far as movies are concerned people in media are really trying to break that image that's why we have movies like Mary Com, Dangal, Neerja, Queen, English Vinglish or Dear Zindagi and lot more where we see ourselves overcoming the emotional and physical barriers to breath, to know and explore ourselves better though we really need to change the scenario with TV and advertisements where they are portrayed even for men's products, and we should ask that to ourselves why do we need women to be show cased in a condom advertisement or a shaving cream ad? Death of Coffee King : Lessons to be Learnt

Entrepreneurs are the harbingers of national prosperity. The tragic death of coffee baron V.G. Siddhartha brought to focus the issues faced by entrepreneurs in the contemporary global business environment. The founder of India's largest chain of coffee shops, Cafe Coffee Day, apologized for "failing to create the right profitable business model." With this unfortunate event, a question pops in mind 'Ease of doing business in India' is a myth or a reality? While the business leaders are shocked, it has become an eye-opener on how feeble an Indian entrepreneur is. Siddhartha mentioned in his note, "My intention was never to cheat or mislead anybody, I have failed as an entrepreneur." For the coffee-growers community in Malnad, where he was born, Siddhartha was a symbol of pride. "For coffee planters, he was their ATM. If a planter facing any trouble approached him, they could be assured of his help," quoted BL Shankar, former Congress MP from Chikkamagalur. So, did he actually fail as an "entrepreneur"? We need to delve deeper to find out. The man who is credited with introducing the largely tea-drinking population to the western concept of branded coffee-shop, created a plethora of jobs, looked into the well being of the coffee growers and his staff, succumbed to the pressure from tax authorities and the investors. In a country like India, where there was inherent liking towards tea over coffee, one couldn't find a place to meet over a cup of coffee to chat. At that time, he forayed into this coffee business. Starting with just one and expanding it to the extent of 1700 brightly lit stores spread across the country, he provided air-conditioned civility accessible to young people in even the smaller Indian towns.

This incident has been taken more viscerally by the corporate elite of India as it happened at a time when the economy-wide cash crunch and slowdown has already imposed a mounting strain on business leaders. Perhaps, managing debts, segregating personal and business finances, cutting down on unnecessary expenses, keeping family members informed and taking sufficient insurance are few takeaways from this episode. At the same time, taking a cognizance of failed business related suicides also needs to be done and appropriate governmental interventions to avoid such failures needs to be devised. In order to reap the advantage of demographic dividend, the country needs more and not less of the entrepreneurs who are 'job providers' rather than 'job seekers'.

BRAHAM KUMARIS

The Brahma Kumaris are a Spiritual movement. It teaches a form of meditation that focuses on identity as souls, as opposed to bodies. They believe that all souls are intrinsically good and that God is the source of all goodness. The organisation teaches to transcend labels associated with the body, such as race, nationality, religion, and gender, and it aspires to establish a global culture based on what it calls "soul-consciousness".

The movement has distinguished itself from its Hindu roots and sees itself as a vehicle for spiritual teaching rather than as a religion. The Brahma Kumaris prominent role that women play in the movement.

The Brahma Kumaris see humans as being made up of two parts; an external or visible body (including extensions such as status and possessions) and a subtle energy of the soul whose character structure is revealed through a person's external activity - but always this is created by the inner soul - whether actions are done with love, peacefully, with happiness or humility is an aspect of one's soul. The group teaches that the soul is an infinitesimal point of spiritual light residing in the forehead of the body it occupies, and that all souls originally existed with God in a "Soul World", a world of infinite light, peace and silence. The Brahma Kumaris teaches that souls enter bodies to take birth in order to experience life and give expression to their personality. Unlike other Eastern traditions, the Brahma Kumaris do not believe that the human soul can transmigrate into other species.

The Brahma Kumaris use the term "Supreme Soul" to refer to God. They see God as incorporeal and eternal, and regard him as a point of living light like human souls, but without a physical body, as he does not enter the cycle of birth, death and rebirth. God is seen as the perfect and constant embodiment of all virtues, powers and values and that He is the unconditionally loving Father of all souls, irrespective of their religion, gender, or culture.

The Brahma Kumaris believe God's purpose is to be the spiritual re-awakening of humanity and the removal of all sorrow, evil and negativity. They do not regard Him as the creator of matter, as they consider matter to be eternal.

Pratibha Patil, the UPA-Left candidate and former President of India said on camera during the 2007 Indian presidential election, that she spoke to

"Baba" (a term the BKs use for God) at the Brahma Kumaris World Spiritual University at their Headquarters in Mount Abu, Rajasthan. Patil stated that when she met Baba He had indicated great responsibility was coming her way.

The Brahma Kumaris believe that every action performed by a soul will create a return accordingly, and that the destiny of the soul's next body depends on how it acts and behaves in

this life. Through meditation, by transforming thinking patterns and eventually actions, the Brahma Kumaris believe that people can purify their "karmic account" and lead a better life in the present and next birth.

The Brahma Kumaris believe that modern civilization will be destroyed by global nuclear conflict, coupled with natural calamities and that these cataclysmic events form part of a natural and cathartic cyclic process.

The Brahma Kumaris teaches a form of meditation through which students are encouraged to purify their minds. This may be done by sitting tranquilly, then making affirmations regarding the eternal nature of the soul, the original purity of one's nature, and the nature of God. The aim of the BK meditation is also to learn to hold meditative states while being engaged in everyday life. For this reason meditation is usually taught and practiced with open eyes.

Flowing on from the BK belief that everyone is a spiritual being, is the practice of Shubhawna (pure feelings) and Shubkamna (good wishes). A flagship slogan for the BKs has been When we change, the world changes. It is for this reason that BKs consider bringing about this kind of change within the self as an important form of "world service".

Brahma Kumaris' students study the Murli. The Hindi word Murli literally translates to "flute". It is an oral study, read to the class early each morning in most BK centres on the world.

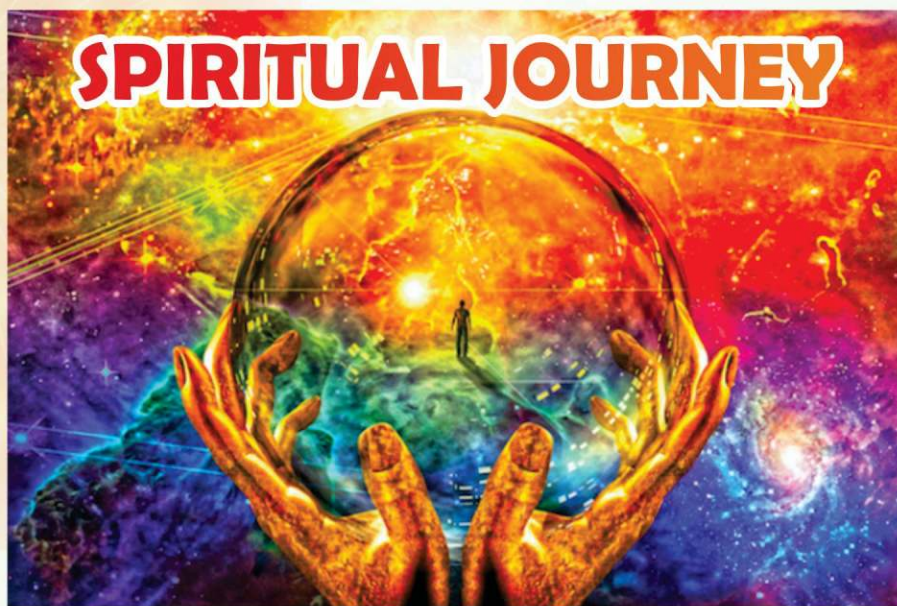
सुख कहाँ है?

Chandrayaan 2 – Expanding the boundaries of human knowledge



The Moon is the closest cosmic body at which space discovery can be attempted and documented. It is also a promising test bed to demonstrate technologies required for deep-space missions. Chandrayaan-2 aims for enhancing our understanding of the Moon, stimulate the advancement of technology, promote global alliances and inspire a future generation of explorers and scientists.

Moon provides the best linkage to Earth's early history. It offers an undisturbed historical record of the inner Solar system environment. Though there are a few mature models, further explanations were needed to understand the origin of the Moon. Extensive mapping of lunar surface to study variations in lunar surface were essential to trace back the origin and evolution of the Moon. Evidence for water molecules discovered by Chandrayaan-1, required further studies on the extent of water molecule distribution on the surface, below the surface and in the tenuous lunar exosphere to address the origin of water on Moon.

The Lunar South pole is especially interesting because of the lunar surface area that remains in shadow is much larger than that at the North Pole. There could be a possibility of presence of water in permanently shadowed areas around it. In addition, South Pole region has craters that are cold traps and contain a fossil record of the early Solar System.

Chandrayaan 2 mission is a highly complex mission, which represents a significant technological leap compared to the previous missions of ISRO. It comprised an Orbiter, Lander and Rover to explore the unexplored South Pole of the Moon. The mission is designed to expand the lunar scientific knowledge through detailed study of topography, seismography, mineral identification and distribution, surface chemical composition, thermo-physical characteristics of top soil and composition of the tenuous lunar atmosphere, leading to a new understanding of the origin and evolution of the Moon.

After the injection of Chandrayaan-2, a series of maneuvers were carried out to raise its orbit and on August 14, 2019, following Trans Lunar Insertion (TLI) maneuver, the spacecraft escaped from orbiting the earth and followed a path that took it to the vicinity of the Moon. On August 20, 2019, Chandrayaan-2 was successfully inserted into lunar orbit. While orbiting the moon in a 100 km lunar polar orbit, on September 02, 2019, Vikram Lander was separated from the Orbiter in preparation for landing. Subsequently, two de-orbit maneuvers were performed on Vikram Lander so as to change its orbit and begin circling the moon in a 100 km x 35 km orbit. Vikram Lander descent was as planned and normal performance was observed upto an altitude of 2.1 km. Subsequently communication from lander to the ground stations was lost.

The Orbiter placed in its intended orbit around the Moon will enrich our understanding of the moon's evolution and mapping of the minerals and water molecules in Polar regions, using its eight state-of-the-art scientific instruments. The Orbiter camera is the highest resolution camera (0.3 m) in any lunar mission so far and will provide high resolution images which will be immensely useful to the global scientific community. The precise launch and mission management has ensured a long life of almost seven years instead of the planned one year.

Chandrayaan-2 has several science payloads to expand the lunar scientific knowledge through detailed study of topography, seismography, mineral identification and distribution, surface chemical composition, thermo-physical characteristics of top soil and composition of the tenuous lunar atmosphere, leading to a new understanding of the origin and evolution of the Moon.

The Orbiter payloads will conduct remote-sensing observations from a 100 km orbit while the Lander and Rover payloads will perform in-situ measurements near the landing site.

FASTag to be mandatory from December 15, 2019



The FASTag is like a sticker with a magnetic strip that will be at the top left corner of the vehicle's windscreen that uses Radio Frequency Identification (RFID). This will help the passenger and commercial vehicles to pass through the toll booths without halting for paying the toll tax. After the amended Motor Vehicles Act, now the Indian auto industry is set to see the adoption of new technology.

Prime Minister Modi announces USD 50 million assistance to Sri Lanka to deal with terrorism

Prime Minister Narendra Modi on 29th November 2019 announced a financial assistance of USD 50 million to Sri Lanka to deal with the challenge of terrorism after holding "fruitful talks" with Gotabaya Rajapaksa, the new elected president of island nation.



Chief of Defence Staff Post



The Chief of Defence Staff (CDS) will be the highest-ranked officer of India's armed forces. It will be the four-star army officer and provide his recommendations to the central government about all three armies – Air Force, Army, and Navy. It will serve as the unified military advisor to the Prime Minister and the Minister of Defense. It will also advise on nuclear matters in the situation of war. However, tenure of CDS has not yet declared.

A committee set up to review flaws in the country's security system suggested the appointment of CDS as the unified military advisor to the Defense Minister in the wake of the Kargil War of 1999. The committee found a lack of communication among all three armies. It was advised that a CDS can play a major role in such a situation.

There are some countries in the world, including America, China, United Kingdom, Japan, have a system like Chief of Defense Staff. However, they have different names for this post like - Supreme Commander, Commander-in-Chief, Chief of Staff, etc.

Stubble burning from Punjab and Haryana contributed to 32% of pollution in Delhi



Stubble burning in Punjab and Haryana contributed to 32 per cent of Delhi's overall pollution, according to a report by the Centre-run System of Air Quality The report, which analyses the impact

of pollutant PM 2.5, showed that the highest contribution since October 11, 2019. By stubble burning was seen at 36 per cent. About 32 per cent of pollution by PM2.5 was caused by stubble burning by farmers in Punjab.

Preposterous to Question Where True Muslims Should Offer Namaz: SC Junks Extreme Views on Islam in Ayodhya Verdict

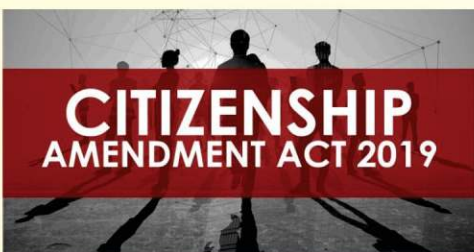
It said that as a secular institution, the Supreme Court, must steer clear from choosing one among many possible interpretations of theological doctrine and must defer to the safer course of accepting the faith and belief of the worshipper.



"Above all, the practice of religion, Islam being no exception, varies according to the culture and social context."

It thus concluded: "There can no hesitation in rejecting the submission made by Mr Mishra. Our Court is founded on and owes its existence to a constitutional order. We must firmly reject any attempt to lead the court to interpret religious doctrine in an absolute and extreme form and question the faith of worshippers. Nothing would be as destructive of the values underlying Article 25 of the Constitution.

CITIZENSHIP AMENDMENT ACT 2019



Protests have broken out across India, a few of them violent, against the Citizenship (Amendment) Act 2019. The Act seeks to amend the definition of illegal immigrant for Hindu, Sikh, Parsi, Buddhist and Christian immigrants from Pakistan, Afghanistan and Bangladesh, who have lived in India without documentation. They will be granted fast track Indian citizenship in six years. So far 12 years of residence has been the standard eligibility requirement for naturalisation.

At the first hearing on petitions challenging the CAA, the Supreme Court declined to stay the contentious law but asked the Centre to file its reply against the petitions that say it violates the Constitution. The petitioners say the Bill discriminates against Muslims and violates the right to equality enshrined in the Constitution.

The legislation applies to those who were "forced or compelled to seek shelter in India due to persecution on the ground of religion". It aims to protect such people from proceedings of illegal migration. The cut-off date for citizenship is December 31, 2014 which means the applicant should have entered India on or before that date. Indian citizenship, under present law, is given either to those born in India or if they have resided in the country for a minimum of 11 years. The Bill also propose to incorporate a sub-section (d) to Section 7, providing for cancellation of Overseas Citizen of India (OCI) registration where the OCI card-holder has violated any provision of the Citizenship Act or any other law in force.

The Centre declares these minority groups have come escaping persecution in Muslim-majority nations. However, the logic is not consistent – the bill does not protect all religious minorities, nor does it apply to all neighbours. The Ahmedia Muslim sect and even Shias face discrimination in Pakistan. Rohingya Muslims and Hindus face persecution in neighbouring Burma, and Hindu and Christian Tamils in neighbouring Sri Lanka. The government responds that Muslims can seek refuge in Islamic nations, but has not answered the other questions.

The President gave his assent to the Citizenship (Amendment) Bill, 2019, on December 12, a day after it was passed by the Rajya Sabha. However, the home ministry has yet to notify the rules to operationalise the law. The notification of rules may now have to wait as a decision in this regard will be taken after seeking experts' advice since the matter is sub judice before the Supreme Court.

The petitions against the Act are listed for hearing on January 22, 2019. The rules can be challenged on legal grounds, the government will wait till January 22, 2019. Since the apex court did not clamp a stay on CAA, the home ministry could notify rules about who all can apply for citizenship, notify the authority and state minimum requirements and cut-off date.

Shiv Sena worker quits over Uddhav joining hands with Congress



The decision of Uddhav Thackeray-led Shiv Sena to join hands with the Congress and NCP to stake claim to form government in Maharashtra has not gone down well with a party worker from Mumbai who announced his resignation on 26 November 2019.

Mumbai now officially Maximum City, open 24X7



The announcement was made by Maharashtra ministers Anil Deshmukh & Aditya Thackeray that malls, shops, eateries, multiplexes in non-residential areas like BKC, Nariman Point remain open 24X7 from January 27, 2020.

International News

Australian Bush Fires



Australia was engulfed with smoke in Jan 2020. The wildfires that the country experienced that moment were a result of man-induced global warming.

There had been quite a few human casualties and the bushfires had burned nearly 5 million hectares of land. Australia saw the hottest and driest season this year with the temperature reaching almost 50 degrees celsius. The bushfires had an extreme effect on the wildlife of Australia. According to reports over 8,000 koalas, which is approximately 30 per cent of the total population in NSW's mid-North Coast region had been lost to fire.

Hong Kong protests against China

Hong Kong is significantly different from other Chinese cities. It was a British colony for more than 150 years - part of it, Hong Kong island, was ceded to the UK after a war in 1842. Later, China also



leased the rest of Hong Kong - the New Territories - to the British for 99 years. It became a busy trading port, and its economy took off in the 1950s as it became a manufacturing hub. The territory was also popular with migrants and dissidents fleeing instability, poverty or persecution in mainland China. Then, in the early 1980s, as the deadline for the 99-year-lease approached, Britain and China began talks on the future of Hong Kong - with the communist government in China arguing that all of Hong Kong should be returned to Chinese rule. This

meant that while becoming part of one country with China, Hong Kong would enjoy "a high degree of autonomy, except in foreign and defence affairs" for 50 years. As a result, Hong Kong has its own legal system and borders, and rights including freedom of assembly and free speech are protected. Protesters feel the extradition bill, if passed, would bring the territory closer under China's control. "Hong Kong will just become another Chinese city if this bill is passed,"

Prime Minister Narendra Modi has concluded in US visit, including his address to the 74th UN General Assembly in New York and the mega "Howdi Modi" diaspora event in Houston, Texas September 22 and thanked US President Donald Trump for attending it.

Refreezing the Arctic:

How to Bring the Ice Back with Geo-Engineering

The Arctic is heating up faster than anywhere else on Earth and the only way to save the ice may be to intervene directly. The Arctic is in a death spiral. The top of our world is heating up faster than anywhere else on the planet, setting new records for the speed and area of ice melt. We are on track this year to have one of the lowest summer sea ice coverage so far. It is a huge problem, because what happens in the Arctic doesn't stay in the Arctic.

The Greenland ice sheet which alone contains enough water to raise global sea levels by 6 metres is disappearing. The frozen Arctic soil and sediment, or permafrost, is melting, releasing more and more carbon dioxide and methane into the atmosphere. This year, vast wildfires in the peatlands of Siberia have blazed for more than a month, and the Arctic warming is playing havoc with weather systems in the northern hemisphere too. But if you prefer to think simply in terms of money, the economic impact of unmitigated Arctic warming by the end of this century was recently estimated to be \$67 trillion. As US congressman Jerry McNerney says: "When it comes to the Arctic, we're in deep shit." In 40 years, about 2.4 million square kilometres of Arctic sea ice has disappeared.

Nobel Prize- 2019

Prof. Abhijit Banerjee, Prof. Esther Duflo and Prof. Michael Kremer won Nobel Prize at the Nobel Prize ceremony in Sweden on 11th October, 2019. The award carries a purse of 9 million Swedish krona (about Rs 6.5 crore) to be shared among the three winners. Abhijit Banerjee is the second Indian after Amartya Sen to win the Nobel prize in Economics. Like Sen, Banerjee, too, is an alumnus of Presidency College, now Presidency University. While the couples, Banerjee and Duflo, are professors in the department of economics at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology (MIT), Kremer is a professor in the department of economics at Harvard University.

The Trio's researchers together helped obtain reliable answers about the best ways to fight global poverty. Over the last two decades, they helped obtain reliable answers about the best ways to fight global poverty. Their work has revolved around identifying "low-hanging fruits", which are often the most effective interventions in improving outcomes in health and education for the poor.

Their work as "breaking down the problem of global poverty into a number of smaller and more precise questions at individual and group level" has redefined research in development economics over the last 20 years.

Virat Kohli is the fifth Indian batsman to score 250 in a Test innings after Virender Sehwag, Karun Nair, VVS Laxman, and Rahul Dravid.

Dutee Chand won the 100-meter national record with a time of 11.22 seconds during the semi-finals at the National Open Athletics Championships in Ranchi on 12 oct 2019.

Indian shuttler Lakshya Sen won the Dutch Open men's singles title 2019 at Almere, Netherlands on 14 oct 2019.

Yashasvi Jaiswal became the youngest batsman in the world who score a double century in "List A" cricket. He scored 203 runs during the Vijay Hazare Trophy Elite Group A on 18 oct 2019.

Praveen Kumar won gold medal at the 48 Kg category in the 2019 Wushu World Championships held at Shanghai,

China. Praveen became the first Indian (male) to win the title.

Manu Bhaker won gold medal in women's 10m air pistol event at the Asian Shooting Championships.

Rohit Sharma became the first Indian man and second in world cricket to complete 100 T-20 Internationals.

Sharad Kumar won a silver medal in the World Para-Athletics Championships in Dubai.

The International Association of Athletics Federations (IAAF) has been officially renamed as World Athletics.

India will host the Men's Hockey World Cup for the second consecutive time after the country was picked to host the Men's Hockey World Cup in India from 13 to 29 January 2020.

Indian archer Deepika Kumari won gold at the Continental Qualification Tournament held on the sidelines of the 21st Asian Archery Championships in Bangkok, China.

Guwahati is to host the third edition of the Khelo India Youth Games. It is expected to be held from 10 January 2020.

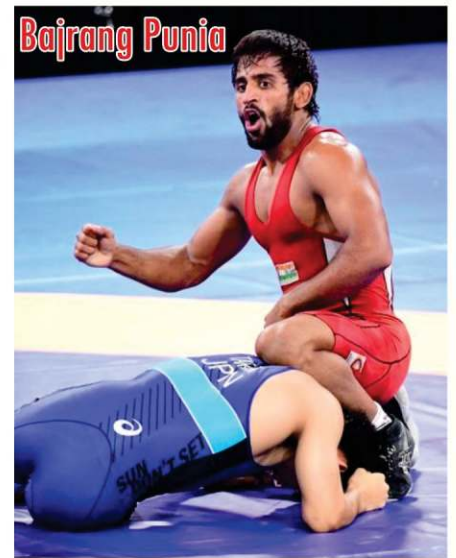
